3.9 Quebec Inter-University Transfer Agreement: McGill Students

The Quebec InterdiniversityTransfer (IUT) agreement permits concurregisteration at McGill and another Quebec institution.

3.11 Courses Taken under the Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U) Option

The principle of the Satiactory/Unsatisactory (S/U) option is to encourage you to atakourses outside the area of your specialization with the offie enabling you to acquire kindedge and skills in aariety of elds.

Where permitted by a fculty and program gellations, you may takone elective course per term to be graded under the Satisfy/Unsatisfictory (S/U) option, to a maximum of 10% of your credits takat McGill to full the degree requirements.

If you decide to have an elective course graded as Satisticatory (S/U), you must do so before the Course Change deadline on Minerv (wwwmcgill.ca/minerv) as part of the Student Menu > Restration Menu > Quik Add or Drop Course Sections MentYou cannot make any changes after the Course Change deadlineven if you selected the option by mistak. If the course is a multi-term course, you must select the S/U option by the Course Change deadline of the rst part of the course.

The instructor will report grades in the normastifion. Grades of through C are concreted to "Satisfactory" (S), and grades of D, and J are concreted to "Unsatisfactory" (U). The courses taken under the S/U option will be called from the grade pointwarage (GR) calculations, bt they will be included in the attempted credits total. Credits for courses with a nal grade of S will also be included in the number of credits earned.


